Chaplain's Chronicles

Dear Serrans,

Praise be Jesus Christ!



I find the stories of missionary priests to be quite inspiring. One of my favorite saints is St. Damien of Molokai, whose feast day is May 10. A simple and even sickly young man from Belgium, he would come to be known for his

sacrificial and tireless service to the lepers quarantined on the Hawaiian island of Moloka'i, eventually dying from the disease himself in 1889. We rightly draw inspiration from our namesake, the Franciscan missionary priest St. Junipero Serra. The story of Blessed Stanley Rother, a missionary priest from Oklahoma, is both contemporary and compelling. Fully aware of the danger he faced by returning to his flock in Guatemala, he stated that "the shepherd cannot run." He was martyred in 1981.

The tales of saintly missionary priests can help us envision more clearly what we are praying for when we ask the Lord in the Serran Prayer for Vocations for an increase of "fellow laborers with Christ to spend and consume themselves for souls." Especially when we consider our diocesan priests, their mission fields are not remote islands, outposts, and villages; rather they are our own households, parishes, and cities – immersed as they are in a culture increasingly forgetful of or even hostile to the Gospel. The current *Program for Priestly Formation*, the guiding document for seminaries in the United States, asserts, "The goal of priestly formation is to form missionary disciples so that they are ready for consecration as shepherds for God's People, sharing in the authority of Christ the Redeemer, who sent the Apostles to preach and heal. In this way, priestly formation clearly must have a missionary character" (n. 14).

When we pray for priestly vocations, let us be specific in praying for our current and future priests that they be men who do more than simply open the church doors and keep the lights on. Let us pray for men who can be true 21st century missionaries!

He needs our help to support his mission. That starts with prayer for him and his work. The Seven Serrans program is an effort to assure that every day he is supported in our prayers.

Encouraging and praying for our seminarians is also so important. Of course, we are focusing on Spokane seminarians, who we hope will one day be ordained to serve our diocese. Being a mentor, friend, and spiritual supporter for our seminarians will help them in their growth and discernment process.

Finally, all of these processes provide an opportunity for Spokane Serrans to grow in personal holiness.





often incorporated the Serran "A Call to Holiness" programs. He invited many interesting speakers, for example, Msgr. Brian Mee, Msgr. John Steiner, and Fr. William O'Brien, pastor of Sts. Cyril and Methodius Byzantine Catholic Church. PRAYER INITIATIVE FOR VOCATIONS or SEVEN SERRAN PRAYER TEAM

Vocations directors are on the front line working for our church. They need our prayers. Serra is organizing an effort to ensure that every vocations director in the U.S. has at least one Serran praying for them for one hour each day of the week for one year.

Serra Club of Spokane is re-vitalizing it's seven-member team of prayer warriors. All it takes is a commitment to pray for one day of the week for one hour, for one year in support of Fr. Kyle Ratuiste, director of vocations.

If 14 Serrans join this effort, we can ask USAC to provide us with the name of a vocations director from a diocese without a Serra Club and have a seven-member team praying for them – this is the goal! Sign up today.

It is easier than you think. Team members/prayer warriors choose one day of the week to pray for one hour, for one year.

Here are some options for completing one hour of prayer:

- Attend daily Mass and communion (and if necessary to complete one hour, pray a rosary or other prayers);
- Attend a Holy Hour;
- Pray from home for an hour. An app such as Hallow or Amen may be of help.


If you are unable to complete your hour, for instance, you are traveling or ill, please ask another Serran to pray on your day.

Mark your day on your calendar for one year so as not to forget to pray. If it does happen, remember what Mother Teresa said, "we do not have to be successful, we just keep trying."

ADOPT-A-SEMINARIAN

As part of our mission to foster and affirm vocations to the ministerial priesthood, you are invited to adopt a seminarian in formation for the Diocese of Spokane. While not a new concept, it has been some time since we last adopted seminarians. This is an excellent opportunity to provide spiritual and moral support to our Spokane seminarians as they strive to grow in relationship with God and follow His will; especially if you find it difficult to attend the monthly luncheons, Holy Hours for Holy Vocations, and other events.

Adopting a seminarian involves a one-year commitment that may be renewed annually. Please adopt one seminarian per person. A couple may each adopt a seminarian or adopt one seminarian together. However, a seminarian may be adopted by multiple Serrans.

You have the option of choosing a seminarian or having one assigned. Information on the activities and needs of the seminarians will be sent by the program coordinator, Frank Heinzen, throughout the year.

Serrans are *expected* to:

Pray for their seminarian daily by name!

Serrans are *encouraged* to:

Send occasional notes or letters, for instance:

- To introduce yourself and give updates about your experience of being Catholic in vour parish and in the diocese.
- Send a greeting card for liturgical holidays, e.g., Christmas and Easter. •
- To encourage him during notable times of challenge, e.g., finals week.

Attend the Holy Hour for Holy Vocations on Thursdays before First Friday at Bishop White Seminary.

Serrans are *permitted* to:

Give gifts for religious holidays or other special occasions. You may ask your adoptee for his birthdate or email address, but do not be disappointed if neither is given to you. For instance, men in the Cor Christi program do not have email.

- Invite seminarians to dinner if it does not conflict with seminary schedule. While living in a community setting, it is preferable that seminarians go in pairs.
- Gifts are not to be expensive, i.e., less than \$50.
- Money or checks need to be reported to the program coordinator. •



March Luncheon – Fr. Andrew O'Leary

Father Andrew O'Leary regaled 22 Serrans and two guests at our March luncheon meeting with several humorous and thoughtful stories. Guests included Tom Wade, a guest of Frank Heinzen, and Deacon Victor Lopez, who led us in adoration.

His stories were unique, but considering Fr. Andy's path to the priesthood, not surprising. He was married and has two children, a son, and a daughter. Both are serving our country in the military. Fr. Andy himself spent many years as a nurse in the Navy.

He is a humble man who learned to trust God. He entered seminary at age 42. He told us how he had to change his identity from layman to deacon and then priest, since he had lived the lay life for so many years, and what that change would mean.

Once ordained, his friends would tell him many things they had never told him before. Shortly after

ordination last year, he travelled to Lourdes with Bishop Daly, our chaplain, Father Ratuiste, and several seminarians. Many profound events transpired, and he began to experience the meaning of priesthood.

He is currently assigned as parochial vicar at Our Lady of Lourdes Cathedral. I recommend going to the Serra website (<u>https://serraclubofspokane.com/home/news/#media</u>) and listening to his presentation. You will then truly experience the depth and devotion of our newest diocesan priest.

April Luncheon – Fr. Miguel Mejia

We had 27 people attend the luncheon and program at IHRC. Deacon Richard Borda came for a second time. Our chaplain, Fr. Kyle Ratuiste led the blessing and Deacon Victor Lopez led the adoration liturgy.

Our speaker was Father Miguel Mejia, pictured at right with Greg Takisaki, who is the pastor of Our Lady of Fatima Parish. He was pinch hitting for Father Pat Hardin who was under the weather but is now feeling a little better.

Father Mejia talked about what has enabled him to persevere in his vocation as a priest for 23 years. He came to Bishop White and Gonzaga when he was 19 years old. He fondly remembered Serra Club gatherings where he discovered maple bars which are still his favorite. He thanked Serrans for our prayers and support during his formation. He was ordained in 2000 at Our Lady of Lourdes Cathedral and was part of a group of 6 ordinations. He started by serving in Pasco and Othello serving Spanish speaking parishioners. In 2008 he came to Spokane to help Fr. Dublinski who was at the time the Vicar General. He was then in Cheney for 2 years and has been at Fatima for the last 9 years.

The first thing that has helped him to persevere is prayer, both personal and community. He really likes spending time in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel at Fatima which is small and personal. He sees that chapel as a true blessing for him.

The second thing that encouraged him is having contact with people. In 2008 Bishop Skylstad asked him to be the chaplain for the House of Charity. Initially he was revolted by the homeless people and their conditions. He couldn't handle it and left. He however did return, and he said, "That experience changed my life." It helped him to see the presence of God in people. He also has lots of assignments that forced him to venture into areas where he had no experience but working with laity encourages him to see people doing things for the love of God, family, and the Church. He is strengthened and inspired by peoples' faith.

He finished by reminding us of the power of our prayer.

Select findings from a NRVC/CARA study on vocations to religious life

As we continue to pray for and promote vocations to the priesthood and consecrated religious life, feel free to share these fun facts with others to increase awareness of vocations to religious life.

Ethnic diversity among perpetually professed sisters, brothers, and priests continues to increase. Current percentages: Mixed Races/Ethnicities 1%, African

- Percentages. Mixed Naces/Litinicities 1/8, Anneal
 American/Black/African 6%, Hispanic/Latino(a) 10%, Asian/Pacific Islander 13%, Caucasian/white/Anglo 70%.
 - Thirty percent of newer entrants in religious life are African American/Black/African, Asian/Pacific
- 2 are African American/Black/African, Asian/Pacific Islander, Hispanic/Latino(a), and Mixed Races/Ethnicities.

Nearly all (95%) of perpetually

3 professed sisters, brothers, and priests earned at least college degree, and 70% have a master's degree or more.

The majority (67%) of perpetually professedsisters, brothers, and priests in the U.S. live in the Northeast and Midwest.

5 Seventy-seven percent of religious institutes have a vocation director or vocation team.
